sychology Trip to Cambridge University with Cambridge Academics – 24<sup>th</sup> February 2015

We went to Cambridge to experience what university lectures in psychology are like.

The Year 12 Psychology students enjoyed the experience of listening to Academics in three different fields of specialisms:

### Memory with Dr Lucy Cheke A Research Academic at Cambridge University

Lucy defined Memory as a change in output function (behaviour) following a change in input (experience). She spoke about how information is stored through different types of memory that have been identified.

### Dr Paul Wilkinson – Psychopathology

Paul is a practising psychiatrist specialising with young children and adolescents in Cambridgeshire. Paul explained that self-harm is deliberately damaging one's own body this can be internal or external. Risk factors for self-harm include mental illness, mental distress and hopelessness. Treatments include Cognitive Behavioural Therapy and Psychotherapy.

### Attachment Theory with Dr Lucy Blake

Lucy spoke about the importance of the infant and young child should experience a warm, intimate and continuous relationship with his mother in which both find pleasure. She suggested that the concept of an Internal working model is a prototype for future intimate and emotional relationships.

Maths Conference at the University of London Thursday, 29<sup>th</sup> January

On the 29<sup>th</sup> January, Year 12 A Level Maths students attended the A Level & IB Maths Conference at Goldsmiths, University of London. Speakers at the Conference were renowned mathematicians – Dr Piers Bursill-Hall from Cambridge University, Matt Parker from the University of London, and Professor Marcus du Sautoy, from Oxford University.

The first speaker, Dr Piers Bursill-Hall, discussed Copernicus' theories and led fascinating speculation about the philosophy intertwined with Maths by bringing in Platonic theorem, relating to what is "real" and existent on different planes, and why Maths works with everything in the universe. He also engaged students by asking questions about why believe the things we do, if we are told them, and by discussing popular misconceptions about theories of the universe.

Matt Parker followed Dr Bursill-Hall's thought-provoking lecture with his own comedic and very entertaining presentation of Maths, bringing the students to awe with his Maths tricks, for example, figuring out the last number of a barcode just by looking at all the previous numbers. He also amazed his audience by showing how an entire image can be made up of just a spreadsheet, and impressed them with his binary scarf.





Professor Marcus du Sautoy encouraged his audience to take Maths further at university, showing how Maths can be used in the real world. He used the example of the population of lemmings, which have population numbers that fluctuate with great variance approximately every four years, and how Maths can explain this fluctuation using statistical models.

The day proved to be greatly enlightening, which was all thanks to the Maths Department for arranging such a wonderful and interesting trip.

## Sixth Form Voice Matthew Tuttle – offer to study Maths at Cambridge.

### Matthew has recently received his offer from Girton College to study Maths, starting in 2015.

### Why did you choose to study maths at University?

I always felt that maths was quite simple to me, it just easily made sense. I chose to do it at University because I wanted to be challenged, and to be given something more difficult than A-Level. I knew that Cambridge would give me that.

### What was the process of applying like?

It wasn't as complex as I expected it to be. I started my UCAS much earlier than most, to make sure my application was in for the earlier Oxbridge deadline in October. I didn't have to submit any extra work to Cambridge, but did have to complete the Supplementary Application Questionnaire (SAQ).

(The SAQ is an extra questionnaire completed by Cambridge applicants, it asks for more information about the candidate before interview).

### Did you have to sit any pre-interview exams?

I had one exam on the same day as my interview, it was just before. I also have to complete exams called 'STEP'. As part of my offer I have to achieve grades 1&2 in Step 2&3.

### What was your reaction when you received the letter informing you of your offer?

My parents read it first because I was asleep when it came, they were so happy! Then they woke me up to let me know. I was completely overjoyed and overwhelmed.

### How did Ellie (girlfriend) react when you told her?

She was so happy for me. She just kept saying "I'm so proud!" over and over again!

### Outside of education, what are your main hobbies?

Football, pretty much just football. I scored at the weekend actually, my first goal of the season in the 94<sup>th</sup> minute!

### What is your favourite subject?

MATHS!

Film?

Ooh, this is a hard one. My favourite film is probably 'Jurassic Park'.

Food?

Pizza.
