GCE 24 NORFOLK SCHOLARS

Congratulations to Springwood's 24 Norfolk Scholars. Executive Head Mr Johnson said "This award is given in the county with A-Level grades of at least ABB, a particular achievement this year in view of the changes to the examination. Previously students could sit modules several times to get their best grades. Now they sit AS levels at the end of Year 12 and A2 at the end".



Overall at A-Level 71% of entries were at A*-C grade which enabled the vast majority of students to gain their first-choice university place



SPRINGWOOD IS STILL TOP PERFORMER AT GCSE

Springwood remains one of the top performers of West Norfolk Schools for GCSE. The results were 60 percent of students achieving 5 A* to C grades including English and Maths. Mr Johnson said "The students have performed well this year. It is difficult to make year on year comparisons as the examination system is very different this year to previous years but we still expect to be well above national averages".

PUBLICATION OF PUPILS'

son/daughter's name and photograph being published, if they let us know we will ensure that this does not happen.



SCHOOL CLOSURES

There are occasions, fortunately very rare, when the school has to be closed at extremely short notice. This could happen because of severe weather conditions which make transport dangerous or because of a breakdown in the heating system.

Any emergency will be broadcast on local radio at regular intervals from about 7 am onwards. This is our only way to notify all of our pupils, parents and staff in time to prevent them coming into school, so we therefore advise everyone to listen to the early morning programmes on KL:FM (96.7) or BBC Radio Norfolk (95.1 or 104.1 FM and 873 or 855 MW) particularly if weather conditions are severe.

COMBINED PRIMARY SCHOOL CONCERT



With St Nicholas Chapel closed for restoration, the annual Combined Primary Schools concert, sponsored by Springwood High School, moved to a new venue this year and on June 12th, over five hundred parents packed into Lynn Minster to hear a wonderful evening of music.

Whilst this mainly involved schools from the Springwood cluster, pupils from 11 different schools were involved in what has become a festival of primary music in West Norfolk.

The concert started with a short performance from Ivan McCready's cello ensemble. For the past two years, Springwood has provided a small number of pupils, mainly from Fairstead, with scholarships to



encourage new players, and the success of this was plain to see with some high quality playing.

Following on from this was the String Orchestra with over 60 players. Under the guidance of Elaine Sargent and Matthew Lee, it was clear that the young players were well rehearsed and enjoying themselves, producing a vibrant sound that filled the Minster.

Next came the Wind Band, with, once again some 60 players. Much of the band rehearse every Monday after school at Springwood, with Year 7 pupils also playing in the band. This provides students with a sense of continuity when moving up from Year 6. This is run by Richard Hall and Deborah Cooper, and the enthusiastic playing was a joy to witness. The concert had a World War I theme running through it, and the band included performances of three WWI songs in their selection.

We are always keen to show the young players what they could achieve if they keep playing, and were delighted that Springwood's Big Band came along and performed two numbers under the direction of Eddie Seales.

The final group of the evening, the 170 strong Combined Primaries Choir, consisting mainly of year 5 & 6 pupils, provided a rousing finale with some wonderful singing. They started off in a slightly sombre mood with a performance of Benjamin Britten's 'Old Abram Brown' as part of the 'Britten and Beyond' festival to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the composer's birth. This was followed by renditions of two WWI songs – 'Pack Up Your Troubles' and 'It's a Long, Long Way to Tipperary' which involved full audience participation. Finally, the choir sent the audience home in an upbeat mood with performances of 'Love, Shine a Light' and 'Happy'.

It was a fantastic concert, the culmination of much work behind the scenes in the primaries and two days hard rehearsal at the Minster, which was a wonderful showcase for the development of music in West Norfolk.

WORLD WAR 1 COMMEMORATION



On the 15 July, the WW 1 Centenary Commemoration event began with a short ceremony in the area outside Blickling and Oxburgh. This began at 0900 with representatives of the Royal British Legion, the Army, the RAF, Bridge for Heroes, the ACF, the ATC, the Brownies and Guides marching from the school gates to form up around the flagpole, this marching was accompanied by "Barnard Castle" played by members of the school concert band. This was followed by a short poem from Mr. Calow, called "Im fernen Polenlande". After this came a speech from Mr. Evans about the costs of the War and other interesting information and personal touches. The Last Post was then sounded by David Maddison,

followed by a 2 minutes silence and then the sounding of Reveille. Then came a prayer of remembrance and the Lord's Prayer, said by Rev. Zoe Ferguson from St. Faith's Church. Wreaths were then laid by Mr Ballman and representatives from the RBL, the Army, the RAF, Bridge for Heroes, the ACF, the ATC and Brownies, this process was accompanied by "Hymn to the Fallen" from the film "Saving Private Ryan", performed by members of the school concert band and the school choir. This was followed by a performance of "In Flanders Fields" by the school choir and the National Anthem, performed by members of the school brass groups. Finally, the parade marched away, back to the school gates, to the tune of "1914" which is a collection of songs from the World War 1 era. Stalls were then erected in the Sixth Form Social Area by the RBL, the ACF, the ATC, Bridge for Heroes, the Army and the RAF.

My thanks go to Flt Lt Petch and Sqn Ldr Jupe for helping me to organize the event, members of the school grounds staff for helping with the marshalling of traffic, Mr. Ballman for allowing us to hold the event and members of the Sixth Form team for allowing us to use the Sixth Form Social Area. I would also like to thank Derek Oldfield, Fiona Marshall and David Butterworth for their help in arranging the music and musicians and Mrs. Frost for documenting the entire event. Finally, to the outside organisations for taking time out of their busy schedules to come and commemorate this event with us.







