

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BERLIN TRIP 2014





Thursday 3rd April our first day in Germany! The weather was lovely nothing like we had left back in England. We got straight off the plane and on to a coach which took us to the hostel, where



we were given a key to our room and had about 5 minutes to rest before we were down for tea. After tea we went on our first tram to the Parliament building. Everything was very strict; we had to be searched before we went in. We had a



lovely walk around there and before we had even made it onto the tram home Mrs Williams directed us into a restaurant where we all had Currywursts, which were delicious!



Then we finally arrived back to the hostel with only about 5 hours until we had to be up again!!

Our second day in Germany was an early start – 6.30 am! We had breakfast and then headed out to



catch another tram which took us to the beginning of a 4 HOUR WALK! It did not sound good at all! We had a German lady as a guide who was from the US so spoke very good English. It was much more exciting than I thought it would be; we crossed over the border from East to West Germany, stood on top of where



Hitler's bunker would have been (a children's playground has now been built here). We visited the air raid shelters where the Berliners went when the bombing was taking place during the war and we climbed up what seemed like hundreds of stairs,



but it was such a beautiful view of Berlin the effort was worth it. Our guide made the day very interesting and told us many facts about life in Germany before and after the Berlin Wall (Berliner Mauer) came down.

In the evening we caught another tram into the city and went to the Eiscafe

where I had ice cream that looked like spaghetti bolognaise (spaghetti ice cream with delicious raspberry sauce).

The next day we visited the Berlin Wall and walked along it to see the artwork on the wall. The artists showed the different way people had tried to escape and were either killed trying to get over or were savaged by dogs if they had







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managed to climb the wall. I could not imagine how it must have been to live with members of your family on both sides of the wall and not being able to go and visit them.

We then visited the rooms where Hitler and his officers planned the killing of the Jews. There were lots of photos and a lot of information about Hitler and the lives of the Jewish people before they were rounded up by Hitler.

In the afternoon we went to the Olympic stadium built in 1936. We had a guided tour we walked round it and saw the football pitch and running tracks. We were allowed in the changing rooms and saw the Jacuzzi where the athletes relaxed after their events.

We then went to Sachsenhausen, a concentration camp where experiments were carried out on many Jews. Others were gassed or shot. This was an unforgettable experience and it is hard for me to think that this sort of thing was happening to human beings just because they were Jewish.

We then had a little while to go shopping for souvenirs before we finished a very long, tiring day with a visit to the TV Tower in the evening. A lift took us up through the centre of the tower to the top where we had a 360° view of the city at night.

On the Sunday, our last day, we packed our bags after





breakfast before going to the Cathedral, built in 1904. We went down into the crypt where there were huge royal tombs as well as tiny baby coffins. We then walked up hundreds of stairs to the dome where we got another wonderful view of the city.

Next we went to the DDR Museum which was underground and was dedicated to life as it was in Eastern Germany. We were free to wander round and use the interactive screens and enjoy the many exhibits on show. We then walked through a market where we bought some more souvenirs and then went to the Pergamonmuseum which stored Roman remains and other historical items.

We were then given time to find something to eat before we went back to the hostel to collect our bags. We were told not to have English food, especially McDonald's! When we eventually found a McDonald's the long queue was full of English Students from Springwood. We then left for the airport and arrived home to King's Lynn at 1.30 am. I was so exhausted from the holiday I slept on the plane and all the way home on the coach.

Our four days in Berlin were non-stop but we saw some amazing sights and learned a lot about life in Germany both before and after the war.



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THE SIGNIFICANCE OF INTERNATIONAL TRADE

Internationalism in the curriculum

Year 9 economics have been exploring international trade which has shown them about a larger range of cultural perspectives that protrudes way beyond the boundaries of Norfolk and even England. Although it may not seem like it, the rest of the world is vital for our lives and without other countries we couldn't live the way we do with the resources we possess. International trade is incredibly relevant to gain resources and generally experience a higher standard of living.

So what is International trade?

International trade is the exchange of goods and services between international borders or territories. It allows us to import (bring goods and services into the country) and export (sell goods out of the country.) If we can bring a variety of goods and services into the country we have a larger choice of how we spend our money and we can buy products from other countries with completely different cultures to our own.

So how can international trade benefit us?

As has been already mentioned international trade offers a variety of cultural perspectives. Another large advantage is that we can gain essential resources we are unable to produce but are essential to the way we live. Other countries to our own have different climates whether their climates are hotter, colder, more rain or more drier, it gives them the opportunity to specialise in and produce their own goods. International trade can also raise countries GDP (their total of goods and services that are produced in a year.) Total GDP is divided by the whole population (GDP per capita) which then shows the standard of living per individual a higher GDP means that there is a higher standard of living per person. International trade can raise countries GDP as by selling goods to other countries brings in money. Bringing in goods also encourages consumer spending which can also boost a countries GDP.

What type of goods do we trade with other countries? China has one of the largest productive industries in the world we trade many goods with them such as:

Clothing Handbags Machine parts Automotive parts and supplies, etc.

Switzerland has a rather cold climate therefore struggles to grow crops and many produce goods so it is fairly reliant on trade. We also gain goods and services from them however e.g. computer mice.

So the world outside Norfolk and England can be revealed through international trade. International trade has proven to be essential for all countries and improves the way they live.

TRIP TO SORRENTO, ITALY By Ciera McKenzie



On 1st April, around 30 of us studying GCSE or A level Geography and Classics set off on an early morning

flight to Sorrento. We visited many amazing attractions, including Pompei, Mount Vesuvius, Capri, the Amalfi coast and Volcano Solfatara. We climbed to the top of Mount Vesuvius (about 1,270 meters high) and learnt about its history and the impacts its eruptions have had on the local area. We also toured the ruins of Pompei and looked at the remains of the buildings and streets that had survived the deadly eruption of Vesuvius in AD 79. In Pompei, we saw several ancient Roman bodies that had been killed and preserved by the thick rain of ash that landed



on the town after the eruption. The bodies were left in the exact positions of when they died, faintly even showing their facial expressions! In Amalfi, we went on a short boat ride along the coast to visit some of the caves in the edge of the cliffs. The caves were beautiful and the rock had some very tiny crystals in it. It was an amazing experience that I will never forget!

KS5 Chemistry visit to Palm Paper (09/05/14)

A Royal Society of Chemistry sponsored event:

Discovering how Britain's biggest paper machine is making paper from 100% recycled material

Everybody knows about newspapers from their everyday lives. Most people also know that these are made in the UK from 100% recycled material, but how? Ask a Year 12 or 13 Springwood High School chemistry student! We can now tell you exactly how paper is made thanks to our recent RSC chemistry visit to Palm Paper Ltd. Cutting edge science and industrial production right on our doorstep - King's Lynn - the UKs biggest and newest machine for producing Newsprint Paper.

First we investigated the process from waste paper to clean fibre material for the paper machine. Then afterwards we saw how the largest machine for newsprint paper in Europe can produce a sheet out of these fibres. Following this we then watched scientists at work in Palm Paper's state of the art laboratory, where the ink is removed from the paper fibres in the de-inking process. One of the many highlights of the visit included the opportunity to make a new sheet of paper by hand. Finally, before setting off home had the chance to see how the Palm Paper Effluent Treatment plant cleans the water used in the process.... Much of the work carried out by friendly little bacteria.

We are very grateful to Palm Paper and The Royal Society of Chemistry for organising this amazing event. We came away with images of efficiency, automation, robotics, complex logistics, industrial production on a mind blowing scale and the importance of ethical and responsible production – from recycling, environmental impact and sustainability for future generations.
