


FROM KL TO NYC!

On 23rd April we were one of 15 schools partaking in the national final of the Barrister Mock Trials competition at London's Old Bailey.

It was the 25th anniversary of the competition run by the Citizenship Foundation and therefore we all felt part of something very special. The Springwood students all got to meet other competitors such as those from the Dalriada School in Northern Ireland who went on to win the competition.

Although we had competed in the Magistrates Mock Trials when the students were in years 8 and 9, this was the first year we had



They had two cases to learn and prepare for; a drugs charge and a case of theft. Preparing for the competition was not easy; it required weekend, afterschool and lunchtime rehearsals, which could sometimes be a logistical nightmare. However, arriving at the Old Bailey the night before and getting the chance to view it when empty, was a once in a lifetime experience; as was competing in one of the most famous court rooms in the world!

Although the Springwood team didn't win, and didn't expect to, they had a fantastic experience and due to sponsorship were able to travel down the day before and stay over in a London Hotel.

They would all agree that it's been a fantastic experience and luckily for them it won't end here. Coming in the top 10 at the Old Bailey National Final has enabled them to secure a place in the international finals in New York in November; the only English school to make it through.

They will now spend their summer preparing for the trip and will have to learn American law as well as new criminal cases.

However, before that news, they were treated to a lunch with the governors and our local MP Sir Henry Bellingham who wished them well and took the time to hear all about the process.

They have all learnt so much about the law here in the UK and how our criminal Justice system works. As they always tell me...if I ever need representing, I know where to go! Miss Roberts

CPR

The British Heart Foundation mission is to introduce CPR into all secondary schools and Mrs Leeke's Tutor group at Springwood High School has accepted this challenge. Every year in the UK over 60,000 people suffer from cardiac arrest outside of hospital and do not receive bystander CPR which means less than one in ten people survive. In Norway CPR is taught in all schools. Resulting in 1 in 4 people surviving. In, Seattle America there is a 56% survival rate, compared to 2-12% in England. The British Heart Foundation want to create a Nation of Life Savers and I believe that the pupils of the school should play a part in potentially saving lives to increase a person's survival rate.

The Springwood pupils have been amazing throughout, filming using up not just tutor time but break times and lunch to complete this mission. Plus we have had years 7 to year 13 working closely empowering all year groups. The year 13 media students have also used the film in their university portfolios as they directed,



filmed and edited the finished product. Now the film has been made, the aim is to visit every tutor group within the school for pupils to teach pupils. Secondly, thanks to the kind donation from the BHF the pupils will be able to book out a CPR bag in order to teach somebody at home, thereby cascading the information down. We also aim to have a wall in the school from the photos that the pupils take of them teaching others as a reminder of how important this knowledge is.

All of this could not have been possible without the talent of the Tom Anderson, Ciaran Back and Ben Steel overseen by Mr Gavin McKenzie and music by Mr Peter Cuss.

The British Heart Foundation has also seen the finished film and could not praise the children enough for both their talent and involvement. Mission CPR began on the 22nd June when Springwood High School tutor group SD06 set out to teach other tutor groups within the school.

As from 27 June over 220 pupils have been taught CPR, with 12 members of staff by SD-06









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



Thursday 16th June marked the return of Futures Day, an event aimed at highlighting the range of opportunities available to our Sixth Students upon completion of their A Levels. The day started with a talk from a number of ex-Springwood students who outlined their current career and the different routes they took to enter them. Then it was on to the Employers Fair where students had the opportunity to speak to a range of employers from accountants to estate agents, the armed services to radiologists, primary schools to the insurance brokers, surveyors to the emergency services and many more besides.

A number of past students including those who had presented earlier were also available for in depth discussions. During this hour long session students were able to ask questions about the qualifications required for different roles, speak to professionals about their experience of their role allowing them to gain a better understanding of the different roles available and the routes that can be taken to enter them. A number of local universities including Cambridge University, Bishop Grosseteste University, University of East Anglia, Lincoln University and

University Campus Suffolk were also represented. Having been able to speak to employers about the possibilities of apprenticeships, students then received a talk from Carly from 3AAA apprenticeships who discussed the benefits of undertaking Higher Level Apprenticeships and how to access them.

After lunch students spent went on to hear about gap year opportunities from Flora who represented Project Trust, a gap year organisation which provides placements in teaching, social care and outward bounds in South America, Africa and Asia

The final session of the day, presented by Rebekah from UEA, focussed on applying for university through UCAS. This talk opened students' eyes to the sheer number of degree choices available to them (37,000!) and provided a brilliant starting point for our UCAS Super Learning Day on 8th July.



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RIVER GLAVEN – TUES 3RD MAY AND WED 10TH MAY

As part of the GCSE, all pupils need to complete primary fieldwork and as such the Geography Department took Year 10 pupils to the River Glaven, Holt to assess the discharge and sediment characteristics of the river. Pupils visited 3 sites along the river and collected primary data from the river to help with their controlled assessment. Pupils collected width, depth, velocity and sediment size and roundness at all three sites, and worked well in groups throughout the 2 days.

It was interesting to see the pupils' definitions of appropriate fieldwork wear, as some pupils ended up with ankle high wellington boots, and then wondered why their feet were going to get wet! I fear that we should have made it clearer to some pupils, and next year a visual show of appropriate dress maybe needed!

Creative King's Lynn students name new homes developments

Students from Springwood and St Clements High Schools drew creative inspiration from King's Lynn's past to name three new housing developments set to be built in the town

Housing developer Lovell and the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk asked Year Nine students at the two schools to come up with the names that will be used to market the new homes for Lynnsport. The three developments will create approximately 220 new open market sale and affordable homes.

Having carried out extensive research, including being given a tour of the development sites by Lovell, the student teams pitched their ideas to a panel of judges from Lovell, the council and the West Norfolk Academies Trust.

The winning names – Valentine Fields, Cowper Place and Dewside – were inspired by historical and cultural figures associated with the area as well as the local landscape. Valentine Fields (proposed by a Springwood High School team) commemorates John Sutherland Valentine, who was the chief engineer of the old King's Lynn to Hunstanton railway line, which ran near the area where the new homes will be built. Cowper Place (proposed by a St Clement's High School team) honours 18th century poet William Cowper who wrote about the draining of the river estuary which led to the development of King's Lynn. Dewside (proposed by a Springwood High School team) relates to the area's brooks, streams and waterways.

Lovell regional director Simon Medler says: "All the teams had done excellent research and gave thorough and considered presentations. We set the students the challenge to select names that would ensure the developments could be marketed successfully while promoting all the best aspects of the area for future residents. The names chosen more than meet the brief, thanks to a strong performance by all the teams involved. Wherever we build, we look to involve and benefit local communities, so we're delighted to have been able to engage with the Springwood and St Clements students so successfully through this project. We plan to continue working with the schools throughout the construction programme." As a follow-up task, Lovell has asked the students to develop potential names for the roads which will make up the new developments and will be putting these forward for consideration by the council.

Cllr Alistair Beales, deputy leader of the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk and cabinet member for Regeneration, says: "I was delighted to see the huge effort the Springwood and St Clements students had so obviously put into their proposed names. It takes courage to stand up in public and present your ideas. Early nerves soon gave way to confident and inspiring presentations and all the teams had come up with names that evoke the history of King's Lynn with a modern twist. I am sure the experience will stand the students in good stead in the future and repay all the time and effort they put in – let's also not forget the support of their teachers who should be very proud of what has been achieved."

Springwood High School deputy head teacher David Hutton was delighted by the way students had engaged both in the research process and the presentation to the judging panel: "Both Lovell and the Borough Council have committed to this venture, so working with them has been a fruitful experience and hopefully will lead to other projects where the worlds of business and education benefit from a collaborative approach."

Lovell is set to build up to 600 homes in the King's Lynn area over the next five years through a development management agreement with the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk. Work is set to start next month (August) on the first homes to be built, at Marsh Lane, King's Lynn, with Lovell beginning construction of 130 new homes.

The developments which have been named Valentine Fields, Cowper Place and Dewside by the King's Lynn students will be built during later stages of the construction programme.

SPELLING BEE SEMI-FINALS



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SORRENTO

Between the 7th and the 12th of April I went on the Geography/Classics trip to Sorrento, Italy and it was thoroughly enjoyable. After arriving at school at 1.00 am to head to Stanstead airport for the early morning flight to Naples, once we were all awake we headed for the Archaeological Museum of Naples, in which were some of the remains and mosaics recovered from the sites of Pompeii and Herculaneum after they were buried by the ash and lava of the 79AD eruption. The condition of the artefacts was quite remarkable. After the museum we ventured into Naples and stopped off at a pizza restaurant, of which we ate in the cellar which we had all to ourselves. The prices were very reasonable and the pizzas were exquisite. That afternoon we checked into Hotel Zi'Teresa, Mr Ballman took us on a tour of Sorrento in which we had free time to go shopping. I found a very nice little homemade ice cream shop where I would return everyday to buy 9 scoops of mouth wateringly tantalising ice cream.

The second day of the trip was most probably my favourite and also very interesting because we visited Mt. Vesuvius National Park where we climbed up to the peak and took a group selfie with a selfie stick. It was a long climb for the majority of the group however I had stormed ahead completing the climb over 13 minutes before anyone else but the time passed quickly because they sold pizzas at the top. Following Vesuvius was a sojourn at the burial site of Pompeii. I found it so fascinating that I drifted away from Mr Durham's luxury tour and ended up following an English speaking official tour. Once reunited with the group we were given two hours to explore 'The Forum'. That evening's entertainment was a bowling competition but that was after the tub of 9 scoops.

The plan for day 3 was to go on a full day excursion to the Island of Capri however, due to an inconvenience with the weather the seas were 'too rough' and so the days were swapped and the geography group went to the currently active Volcano of Solfatara. This was a new and thrilling experience because we were able to walk around the crater itself. Our guide then conducted an experiment waving burning newspaper towards the ground creating a giant plume of smoke engulfing the inner batter of the crater. We all went inside a Roman Sauna that was inside the volcano and it was incredible how hot it was inside. That night was followed by a Quiz of the whole trip, volcanoes and other Geographical and Classics Knowledge. Unfortunately my team was second as we were just beaten on the home straight. to drown the sorrows of coming second the quiz was followed by another 9 scoops.

Day 4 commenced with the trip back down to the harbour to see if we could get to Capri. After half an hour of waiting in the blistering sun we were allowed to board the boat to the island. The journey to Capri was about 15 minutes and when we landed the majority of students were complaining that they were feeling seasick, including 'The Ladz', only to find out that next on the agenda was a full boat excursion around the island. The on-sea tour lasted an hour which mainly consisted of the lower school 'geographers bringing up their breakfast and turning their heads over the side of the boat, feeding the fish. When back on the safety of dry land we were given free time to go shopping but everyone spent it at another pizzeria. Once everyone had been well fed, we were taken on an adventure to the top of Capri, to the ruins of Villa Jovis, Emperor Tiberius' house and temple from which he ruled until his death in 37AD. Like Vesuvius the climb showed just how un-fit most people were. After exploring the ruins we were given the option of either more shopping on Capri or a visit to the 'Arc Natural'. Having chosen the Arch, due to previously studying coastal landforms, had turned out to be a disappointment because they were trying to preserve it and so it was covered in scaffolding. Never the less, it should be finished by the time of the next trip in 2018

and I would definitely recommend it because that which could be seen was impressive.

The evening of day 4 was definitely a big highlight of the trip because we went to an ice-cream factory, where we were greeted with a demonstration on how they made Lemon sorbet and were also given free samples and the recipe to take home. This was of course followed by another 9 scoops of tantalising ice cream.

The final day had come too soon. We had to be packed and out of our rooms by 11:00 am but were then given 3 hours to explore Sorrento a little more and go souvenir shopping. In the town centre there were street performers who would dance through the streets. I, of course, went back to the little homemade ice cream parlour where I went even bigger than normal and bought a small tub of 12 scoops of ice cream. The owner of the shop was so amazed that he took a picture of me with my ice cream and put it up on his wall and the parlours Facebook page. In the afternoon, we went back to Naples and were taken on a tour of the underground tunnels that were originally used as a mine to retrieve the building materials used to build the city buildings and then in the Second World War were used as a city wide air raid shelter from the allied attacks. In one of the old tunnels that connected to the ancient theatre of Naples the served a traditionally made pizza. Finally it was our time to leave taking the evening flight from Naples back to Stanstead.

The trip was highly enjoyable and I would definitely recommend it. I was new to the school the year that I went and it was a great chance to forge friendships with others studying the subject. The only real downside to the trip that could not be helped was, because of my allergies, the restaurant at the hotel could not serve me the desserts and so after each meal I was greeted with the phrase "No Eggs!" and given a plate with a piece of fruit and a knife upon it. YOUTH STEMM AWARD CELEBRATION CONFERENCE

Aspiring STEMM students from across the county, including Year 9 & 10 students from Springwood High School, attended a celebratory Youth STEMM Award conference at the University of East Anglia Innovation Centre on Thursday 30th June.

The Youth STEMM award is targeted at those aspiring to pursue a career within the Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematical and Medical fields. These are areas where women are currently underrepresented and we are delighted that twelve of our Year 10 girls have completed the Bronze Youth STEMM Award this academic year. This involved the running of a STEMM club with year 7 students; attending a variety of trips including a tour of Sizewell B in Southwold; attending talks from inspiring Scientists such as James Wong; and finding out about different careers that are STEMM linked and presenting this information to others in an inspiring way.

This celebratory conference included a motivational talk by Professor Danielle George MBE, a leading expert in radio frequency. She discussed her career in science, talking passionately about how it had opened up a world of opportunities for her including delivering the Royal Institution Christmas Lectures in 2014. Her latest project involves international



collaboration working as the UK lead for amplifiers in the Square Kilometre Array (SKA) and developing instrumentation for researchers exploring the Big Bang. This was followed by a lecture from Professor Mark Miodownik on "Materials for the 21st Century" which looked at how modern cities would be built and which materials could be used.

The evening ended with our Year 10 girls being presented with their medals and certificates. There is no doubt that our Year 9 students who also attended were inspired by this experience and will continue the excellent STEMM work started by these

On Thursday 30th June 5 year 7 and 1 year 8 pupils went to Newmarket Race Course to visit the Big Bang Fair as part of their Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths and Medical (STEMM) club activities. During the day we visited the stands from companies providing information about possible careers for people who were interested in any of these areas – they included the Army, GlaxoSmithKline, CLAAS, Cambridge Science Centre, ROCHE, Lockhead Martin, Royal Air Force, Scottish Power and Stansted Airport. We collected information about the companies and what they did and also information about possible future careers with them.

There was also 28 stands where schools from the Eastern Region demonstrated the Stemm projects they had done during the year. These gave us some ideas and thoughts about activities we could do next year as part of our Stemm Club.
