#### 4<sup>TH....</sup> IN THE WORLD!

Yes you read that right, as that is exactly what happened when the SHS Mock Trials team of 9 travelled to the USA before Christmas to take part in the world championships of the Mock trial competition.



Hayley Roberts, project coordinator said: "It has taken them 4 years to progress to this stage and no other UK school has ever come within the top ten".

The students began their journey 4 years ago by taking part in the Magistrates Mock trial for two years in a row. After such success, they progressed to the Bar Mock Trial competition and reached the national final at the Old Bailey.

After doing so well, they made a one-week trip to New York to experience the US judiciary system and to prosecute and defend a terrorism case.

They raised £20,000 in three months to cover the costs and have sponsors and supporters from all over the country:

We arrived in NYC ecstatic, but exhausted. However, there wasn't much time for sleep, as it was election night. We went out into Times Square and could immediately tell that we were going to be witnessing an iconic moment in history; the atmosphere was simply unforgettable.

We felt so very lucky to be invited to the office of one of our sponsors; *Squire Patton Boggs*. To visit them in their incredible New York office at the top of Rockerfella Plaza was incredible (see photos below). This was such a valuable experience as it enabled us to speak face to face with real American criminal attorneys who gave us great advice, which we carried forward with us to the trials.

#### The Competition:

To say it was hard is an understatement, however our confidence grew after each round. As soon as the round was finished, Miss Roberts would rush down to the tab room to find out if we had won or lost our trial and to see our scores. Only teachers were allowed in the tab room and it was kept secure with competition judges and referees monitoring it at all times. It was at this point that we realised just what we had achieved; we were in the WORLD championships and it was more hardcore than anything we had ever experienced in our local, regional and national heats!

We could not believe it when after each round, Miss Roberts kept coming back to us to say that we had won our trials! Consequently, after round 1 we were 10<sup>th</sup> in our division (there were two divisions) After round two we were 8<sup>th</sup>, after round three we were 4<sup>th</sup> and after round four we were 3<sup>rd</sup>!



After each round we really started to believe in ourselves and became more and more confident each time we got up there. We were power-matched after the first round, so for the following rounds we were against schools of similar ability.

There were times when we doubted ourselves; for example all of the schools we were against had prepared physical demonstrations and were introducing many of the 90 exhibits. We had decided not to plan too much and do what felt right at the time. We realised that the key to success was listening to what the other side were saying all of the time, then making notes to bring up conflicting evidence when it was our turn. We even got so brave during a closing speech that we decided to borrow one of the other side's demonstratives! It was a balaclava, which we put on one of our own attorneys to prove that you can't identify someone when all you can see is their eyes! The judges loved this and so did we; we were thriving from our newly found confidence and enjoying every minute.

We knew we had come 3<sup>rd</sup> in our division, but had no idea how much gap there would be between our division and the other division. We knew that after the competition finished, we would have a two-hour wait until we would find out the results at the closing ceremony.

We genuinely expected an easy night; just sitting back and applauding the other teams. The first awards that were given out were for the most outstanding witnesses. We knew our witnesses had done extremely well, but one of our witnesses Samuel Mount came in the top 10 and was presented with an outstanding witness award. We were all reeling with pride, and over the moon that Sam's hard work had paid off.

Finally came the placing of the teams. Out of 44 teams, only the top 15 were announced. We had no expectation at all to be placed in the top 15. When we got to the top 10, we all agreed that we hadn't been placed, so we sat back and listened as the rest of the schools were announced. It had all been American schools, until we got to 5th place, which was won by the Australian team.



As they announced the next team all we heard were the words "and all the way from Norfolk in the UK", and we all looked at each other straight away! The feeling was really like no other. We were all overcome with emotion. There were tears, laughter; it was simply unbelievable. In that moment, we felt the real reward. Firstly ,the pride to be representing our country at an international final, but secondly the sense of achievement. It was in this moment that all the hours, all the after schools, Sunday rehearsals, coming in all through the holidays; it was all worth it - every single second.

For the next two days, we were just overcome with shock, and pride. We couldn't believe how well we'd done and I don't think any of us stopped smiling for the rest of the trip. On one of our last days, we went to Central Park. It was really magical to see all the autumnal colours that surrounded us as we made our way through probably the most iconic park in the world. As you can see, we didn't forget the important banner!

As you can tell from the photo, emotions were still running high. It was midnight by the time the results we were called out and we were drained. but now ecstatic too!





It's incredibly difficult to convey with words, how grateful we are for this experience that all of our sponsors and the school, have given us.

This trip was like no other. It has given every member of our team so much. We have come back almost different people; more mature, more confident, more determined - the list could go on. This really has been the trip of a lifetime, and one that we will never ever forget.

#### STEMM MID-YEAR CONFERENCE

On 26<sup>th</sup> January we attended a mid-year conference as part of our STEMM project in the Johns Innes Centre, Norwich. We have been inspired and gained further knowledge about the science based around Botany and Zoology.

Once we arrived at the venue there were many other schools participating in this STEMM event. There were a variety of several exhibitions on the study of fauna and flora such as carnivorous plants e.g. the Venus fly traps and how they adapt to the environment. The most interesting exhibition was about how logic gates can be used to represent the growth of bacteria and how bacteria are able to reproduce and spread across a plant specimen.

While we were visiting the various exhibitions, we were fascinated by the different studies based on plants, animals and bacteria. For example, there was an exhibition regarding how petals take their specific shape and why individual flower petals and leaves have different shapes. They conducted research on the petals shape and discovered that a gene called Jagged controls the growth of petals

Furthermore, we are more inspired to pursue a career in science due to the main part of the event which was a conference where three guest speakers spoke about how they have achieved their career in science and what inspired them to take it on as well as the qualifications and requirements needed to reach their career. From this event, we have learnt that motivation, determination and hard work are the only factors required to achieve your personal goals.





#### **ATTENDANCE**

The link between attendance and attainment has always been clear. It is much harder to learn when you are not in school than when you are, and that is one of the reasons why, as a school, Springwood has always placed a high priority on all children attending school regularly. Poor attendance not only affects attainment (students with less than 90% attendance are likely to achieve one grade less than students of similar ability who have attended regularly) but can also affect social relationships and development.

We encourage all of our students to attend school 100% of the time, with termly prizes of certificates, bonus achievement points and also the new form group reward. Brook Street Foods have kindly sponsored our winners for January, and they are 7S1, 8B1, 9F1, 10F1 and in year 11 joint winners were 11O2 and 11S2. They will enjoy a treat during form time on one day.

If your child is too ill to send to school it is important that you telephone your child's House Manager on each day of absence, preferably before 9am. For students whose attendance is less than 90% (known as Persistent Absentees, PAs), or who are absent for more than two days, we will require medical evidence for the absence.

Mrs Aviss or I, along with Mrs Starling who is the in-school attendance officer, meet each Wednesday with students whose attendance is around 90% or lower. The purpose of the chat is to establish any underlying causes for the absence and if we can do anything to help improve the school attendance.

For students who continue to have poor attendance, and without any medical diagnosis, we may use a Fixed Penalty Notice, or begin Fast Tracking the student back into full-time education. The Fast Track process involves a meeting between the school, parents, student and Norfolk's Attendance Support and Enforcement Officer. Most Fast Track meetings result in improved student attendance, although some can lead to court proceedings and fines.

It is in your child's best interest to attend school regularly.


#### YEAR 10 ART
