

MESSAGES TO PUPILS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

We are aware that, occasionally, it is necessary for parents to telephone school during the working day to alter the usual arrangement for pupils leaving school at 3.25pm. Any such message can be left with the House Manager. Sometimes pupils also need to be informed of last minute doctor or dentist appointments. Messages are passed to pupils as promptly as possible, but as this is often excessively time consuming we do ask that these be kept to a minimum. Time constraints on administrative staff can make message delivery very difficult, particularly at the end of the day. We know from experience that many calls to school could easily be avoided if arrangements were made at home before **pupils** leave in the morning. Please contact school only in cases of emergency and be assured that urgent messages are forwarded as promptly as possible.

PUBLICATION OF PUPILS' PHOTOGRAPHS AND NAMES

Our school regularly publishes pupils' names and photographs in the Newsletter and sometimes also to the press, and this is always in connection with some notable achievement on the pupils' part. We would not, however, publish such information against parents' wishes.

No parent has ever objected at Springwood, but if a parent does have concerns about their son/daughter's name and photograph being published, if they let us know we will ensure that this does not happen.



SCHOOL CLOSURES

There are occasions, fortunately very rare, when the school has to be closed at extremely short notice. This could happen because of severe weather conditions which make transport dangerous or because of a breakdown in the heating system.

Any emergency will be broadcast on local radio at regular intervals from about 7 am onwards. This is our only way to notify all of our pupils, parents and staff in time to prevent them coming into school, so we therefore advise everyone to listen to the early morning programmes on KL:FM (96.7) or BBC Radio Norfolk (95.1 or 104.1 FM and 873 or 855 MW) particularly if weather conditions are severe.

SUCCESSFUL BOOK LAUNCH

More than sixty people attended the launch of Michael Walker's new book, *Alderman Catleugh Schools, 1957-79,* on 13 September at Springwood High School. The former students and staff watched a powerpoint presentation of school photographs prepared by local film-maker Robert Fuller, who was at the school in the late 1970s. Then there was the opportunity to wander round the former Alderman Catleugh buildings and reminisce with old friends. The continuing buzz of conversation was a measure of the success of the evening.

The guest of honour was Miss Norah Howe-Smith who was successively Deputy Head and then Head of the Girls' School and finally Head of the combined school for the three years before it was merged with the West Norfolk and King's Lynn Girls' High School to form Springwood High School in 1979. Another long-serving member of staff who attended was Mr Noel Sawyer who taught woodwork from 1957 to 1979. Some of the former students who attended were at the Alderman Catleugh Boys' and Girls' schools when they first opened in September 1957.

Many thanks are due to Mr Andrew Johnson, the Executive Principal of Springwood High School, for hosting the event. The book is on sale, priced £7.95, at Waterstones in King's Lynn and from Springwood High School (an order form can be found on the school website.) All profits from the sale of



TANZANIA & KENYA TRIP

We were offered the opportunity two years ago to go to Tanzania and Kenya to do conservation work. It was most certainly the best thing we have ever done.

The trip lasted for 28 days, all of which were packed with challenge, success, beautiful scenery and incredible people. As a team of 25 in total (Springwood making up about 10 of the team), Team Papa set out to conquer all the challenges presented to us. We stayed at four camps, the first of which was Camp Tanga.

Camp Tanga is on the coast of Tanzania and is where we helped



learning, Team Papa dived just off the coast of where our camp was to swim over a wonderful coral reef that was teeming with life. We ended our time at the camp with a culture day where Team Papa went to the village and were shown how to make mandazi and chapatti (which we could not stop eating).

The second camp Team Papa stayed at was Camp Mbokomu where we assisted a school by laying a cement step outside of a classroom and repairing the walls inside one of the classrooms. Later,

we had a culture day in which we visited a tribe where we helped plant banana plants and learned how vital the banana is to the tribe. We also were shown and attempted to carry buckets of water from a stream on our heads which we concluded was easier said than done. Later, Team Papa played a football match against the school where we had been working where we won 3-0 despite the heat.

After Mbokomu, we went on a safari in Manyara where we were driven around the park in open top safari cars and saw elephants, lions, zebra, wildebeest, ostriches, monkeys and so much more.

Team Papa then travelled to Camp Tsavo in Kenya. Whilst there, we helped the community by deworming a lot of unruly goats. As well as this, we went to a tree nursery where Team Papa potted and seeded around 1300 seeds. These seeds will go on to be planted in the surrounding area. We were also told that with the number of trees that we planted, we had all removed our carbon footprint which was awesome.

The 28 days that Team Papa were out in Africa for were unforgettable for all of us and taught us so much. After the trip every one of us came back a changed person, all for the better. We all became more confident, harder working, and most importantly we learned Hakuna Matata. No worries.




PRIMARY ART CONTINUED
