Year 12 Futures Day – Inspiring Pathways for the Future

On Monday 21st October, our Year 12 students took part in our annual Futures Day – a key event designed to help them explore potential career paths and prepare for life beyond Sixth Form. The day was packed with opportunities to learn, ask questions, and make connections with professionals and employers.

Students attended a series of inspiring talks from industry experts and former Springwood students, who shared their experiences and advice across a wide range of sectors including healthcare, law, engineering, and policing. These sessions gave valuable insights into what different career journeys look like, and helped students begin to think about the skills and qualifications they might need for their own ambitions.

The day also featured our hugely successful Careers Fair, which welcomed around 60 local and national employers and education providers. Students made the most of the opportunity to network, ask thoughtful questions, and explore a variety of pathways — from apprenticeships and degree routes to volunteering and gap year opportunities.

As part of our careers programme, all Year 12 students are expected to complete a virtual work experience placement before Christmas (which should now be booked), and begin preparing to arrange a face-to-face work experience for June 2025. These experiences are a vital part of developing employability skills, building confidence, and gaining an understanding of the world of work.

It was fantastic to see Year 12 engaging so positively with every aspect of the day – their curiosity, professionalism and enthusiasm really stood out. Futures Day has set the tone for an exciting year of exploration and opportunity ahead!

KS5 Homework and Independent Study

Whole school attendance Newsletter - Autumn 1

Wren, our attendance dog, is currently enjoying the start of the new school year, welcoming back familiar faces along with the new year 7s and 12s. Thank you for your continued support with good attendance for your child's attendance has continued to be above national figures since the start of the term.

We have had a number of holidays taken during this school year already. We are not allowed to authorise any holidays taken during term time. If your child does not arrive back on the planned day after a holiday we will be required to carry out a welfare check, and this will be completed in person or via an online video call, as we have to see the child. If your child is ill following a holiday we may well require medical evidence. The local authority will issue fixed penalty notices for a total of more than 4 and a half days of any unauthorised absence within a 10-school week period.

We are once again approaching the cold season. Please check out the NHS, https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/, for when you should and shouldn't send your child to school - for most minor ailments they should be in. Please liaise with your child's year office if they are suffering a bit but well enough to attend so that we can be aware of them during the day. If you do feel that your child is too unwell, could you please let the year team know the details, not just "they are unwell". As above, any prolonged absence will require us to complete a home visit.
