Summer Task Title / Instructions:

Consider the question:

What is real?

- 1. Explain Plato's analogy of the cave.
- 2. What does Plato suggest is real?
- 3. Explain Aristotle's 4 causes.
- 4. What does Aristotle say about reality?
- 5. Are there any ethical rules that are true for all times and places?
- 6. Explain the Tibetan Wheel of Life.
- 7. What does Buddhism say about the universe?
- (8. What might a Christian say about reality?)
- 9. What is your conclusion on 'what is real'?

Each question needs about 200 words – some may need more. Question 8 is optional.

Take notice of decisions made by various businesses in the current crisis, and be aware of issues around the world, not just in the UK or Europe.

Watching the film 'Schindler's List' would also be useful.

For Philosophy try 'Sophie's World' but don't worry if you can't understand it all!

For Buddhism try the autobiography of the 14th Dalai Lama, or Siddhartha by Herman Hesse.
