Having assessed the risk, schools must work through the below system of controls, adopting measures in a way that addresses the risk identified in their assessment, works for their school, and allows them to deliver a broad and balanced curriculum for their pupils, including full educational and care support for those pupils who have SEND.

If schools follow the guidance set out here they will effectively reduce risks in their school and create an inherently safer environment.

System of controls

This is the set of actions schools must take. They are grouped into 'prevention' and 'response to any infection' and are outlined in more detail in the sections below.

Prevention

- 1) Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school.
- 2) Where recommended, use of face coverings in schools.
- 3) Clean hands thoroughly more often than usual.
- 4) Ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.
- 5) Introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents and bleach.
- 6) Minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible.

7) Where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE).

Numbers 1 to 5 must be in place in all schools, all the time.

Number 6 must be properly considered and schools must put in place measures that suit their particular circumstances.

Number 7 applies in specific circumstances.

Response to any infection:

- 8) Engage with the NHS Test and Trace process.
- 9) Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community.
- 10) Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice.

Numbers 8 to 10 must be followed in every case where they are relevant.

		Definition of 'clinically extremely vulnerable'						
		Expert doctors in England have identified specific medical conditions that, based on what we know about the virus so far, place some people at greatest risk of severe illness from COVID-19. Disease severity, medical history or treatment levels will also affect who is in this group. Clinically extremely vulnerable people may include: 1. solid organ transplant recipients 2. people with specific cancers: a. people with cancer who are undergoing active chemotherapy b. people with lung cancer who are undergoing radical radiotherapy c. people with cancers of the blood or bone marrow such as leukaemia, lymphoma or myeloma who are at any stage of treatment d. people having immunotherapy or other continuing antibody treatments for cancer e. people having other targeted cancer treatments that can affect the immune system, such as protein kinase inhibitors or PARP inhibitors f. people who have had bone marrow or stem cell transplants in the last 6 months or who are still taking immunosuppression drugs 3. people with severe respiratory conditions including all cystic fibrosis, severe asthma and severe chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) 4. people with rare diseases that significantly increase the risk of infections (such as severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID), homozygous sickle cell) 5. people on immunosuppression therapies sufficient to significantly increase risk of infection 6. women who are pregnant with significant heart disease, congenital or acquired 7. other people who have also been classed as clinically extremely vulnerable, based on clinical judgement and an assessment of their needs. 		Clinically vulnerable staff can return to school in September. While in school they should follow the specific measures in this document to minimise the risks of transmission.						
		This includes taking particular care to observe good hand and respiratory hygiene, minimising contact and maintaining social distancing in line with the provisions set out in section 6, Prevention, of 'The system of controls: protective measures' section of this guidance. This provides that ideally, Minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible. While the risk of transmission between young children and adults is likely to be low, adults should continue to take care to socially distance from other adults including older children/adolescents.
