
To help us prepare, Miss Roberts arranged for us to present our speeches to a group of VI formers who were very experienced in public speaking. This helped us

The teams that presented before us were very good so the pressure was on, but when the time came we delivered our speeches more confidently than we thought we would!

At the end of the Intermediate Competition (years 7-9), we had a short break and then got to relax and watch the Senior Competition. This was really useful to see what we could aspire to later on in our school years. We had a nervous wait once it was all over, but when the results finally came in we had great reason to celebrate because the Springwood team were announced as the winners!

We were presented with certificates and gift cards and we got to celebrate with our parents and Miss Roberts over a complimentary lunch at COWA.

Now it's time for us to work on our speeches even further by taking the advice we were given by the judges this time. This will help us to prepare for round 3, which will take place in Chelmsford on the 21st of April. They found out that degrees in science and medicine would require at least 2 sciences, with their third A-level preferably being another science or maths.






DRAMA SET DESIGNS

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
