GCE RECORD BREAKING RESULTS

Springwood students are celebrating a record year for A' Level results

21% of students gained *A/A grades

45 students, the highest in the school's history, gained Norfolk Scholar status which is awarded to students who achieve ABB grades or higher in their A



73% of the A' level students gained *A-C grades

The highest performing student was Florence Chung who gained 4*A grades in her chosen subjects who will now study at a prestigious Hong Kong University.

There have been many fantastic individual performances including 4 students who are off to study medicine (Kaveeta Malhi – Oxford University, Sam Reynolds – University of East Anglia, Joseph Lawrence – King's College, London and James Wilkinson – Hull University) and one student, Rebecca Sedgwick who will study Veterinary Medicine at Nottingham University.

Springwood students are also seeking International Challenges with Abigail Peters gaining a full scholarship to study at Columbia University in New York! Executive Headteacher, Andy Johnson said; "This has been a phenomenal year for Springwood Sixth Form students. They have all worked incredibly hard alongside our dedicated staff and have seen the fruits of their labour today. The Sixth Form aims to be world class and with two students gaining places to study at world renowned Universities we are achieving this goal"

SPRINGWOOD HIGH SCHOOL CELEBRATE GCSE SUCCESS

Springwood High School is celebrating another fantastic year of GCSE success. This year all subjects moved across to the more challenging GCSE content and grading system with a grade 9 representing a new standard of high achievement above that of the old *A grade.

In total 37 students gained at least one grade 9 in their GCSE grades, the vast majority of subjects had 1 or more students attaining a grade 9.

The highest performing student, Malu Nair, gained a grade 9 in all 12 of her GCSE subjects. In Maths and English, 60% of students achieved the standard pass of grade 4.

Executive Headteacher, Andy Johnson said "This is a fantastic set of results for our students. The new GCSE set a new standard and I am so pleased that our students and staff have risen to this challenge".

Chair of Governors, Roger Livesey said "Springwood places a high emphasis on academic study alongside its excellent extra –curricular offer. It is great to see so many students achieve so well".

MESSAGES TO PUPILS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

We are aware that, occasionally, it is necessary for parents to telephone school during the working day to alter the usual arrangement for pupils leaving school at 3.25pm. Any such message can be left with the Pastoral Manager. Sometimes pupils also need to be informed of last minute doctor or dentist appointments. Messages are passed to pupils as promptly as possible, but as this is often excessively time consuming we do ask that these be kept to a minimum. Time constraints on administrative staff can make message delivery very difficult, particularly at the end of the day. We know from experience that many calls to school could easily be avoided if arrangements were made at home before pupils leave in the morning. Please contact the school only in cases of emergency and be assured that urgent messages are forwarded as promptly as possible.

DATA PROTECTION ACT

The School is required to provide pupils and parents with details of the information it retains, concerning the purpose for which is used, and of any third parties to whom the information may be passed. SCHOOL CLOSURES

There are occasions, fortunately very rare, when the school has to be closed at extremely short notice. This could happen because of severe—weather conditions which make transport dangerous or because of a breakdown in the heating system.

Any emergency will be broadcast on local radio at regular intervals from about 7 am onwards. This is our only way to notify all of our pupils, parents and staff in time to prevent them coming into school, so we therefore advise everyone to listen to the early morning programmes on KL:FM (96.7) or BBC Radio Norfolk (95.1 or 104.1 FM and 873 or 855 MW) particularly if weather conditions are severe.

SIXTH FORM BAKE SALE





WNAT INAUGRAL SUMMER SCHOOL




During August, year 10 students from across the trust spent time at Springwood High School where they took part in Maths, English, Science and Mental Health, well-being sessions.


