Springwood students are once again celebrating another record year for A level results.

- ♦ 78% of students achieved A* to C grades—a 5% increase on last year
- ♦ 45% of students achieved A* to B grades
- 21% of students achieved A* to A grades
- This years highest achieving students were Ellie Chen & Megan Tomsett with A*, A* & A grades

Head of Year 13 Mrs Cuss said "I am very proud of all the students achievements this year. It is my favourite day of the year, seeing so many happy faces go off to their first choice destinations".

Eight students achieved Oxbridge, medicine or law places, the highest in the schools history.

Norfolk Scholar Status (A, B, B or higher) was also awarded to 35 students.

Well done to all our hardworking A Level students!



- Other standout performers were Ezra Nwobodo who gained 4 grade 9's, three grade 8's and two grade 7's. Joshua Ampomah achieved four grade 9's, six grade 8's and one grade 7.

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MESSAGES TO PUPILS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

We are aware that, occasionally, it is necessary for parents to telephone school during the working day to alter the usual arrangement for pupils leaving school at 3.25pm. Any such message can be left with the Year Manager. Sometimes pupils also need to be informed of last minute doctor or dentist appointments. Messages are passed to pupils as promptly as possible, but as this is often excessively time consuming we do ask that these be kept to a minimum. Time constraints on administrative staff can make message delivery very difficult, particularly at the end of the day. We know from experience that many calls to school could easily be avoided if arrangements were made at home before pupils leave in the morning. Please contact the school only in cases of emergency and be assured that urgent messages are forwarded as promptly as possible.

SCHOOL CLOSURES

There are occasions, fortunately very rare, when the school has to be closed at extremely short notice. This could happen because of severe weather conditions which make transport dangerous or because of a breakdown in the heating system.

Any emergency will be broadcast on local radio at regular intervals from about 7 am onwards. This is our only way to notify all of our pupils, parents and staff in time to prevent them coming into school, so we therefore advise everyone to listen to the early morning programmes on KL.FM (96.7) or BBC Radio Norfolk (95.1 or 104.1 FM and 873 or 855 MW)

Duke of Edinburgh Award

The DofE gives you the chance to do something completely new and improve on things you're already doing. It takes you out of your comfort zone and into a place where you'll push yourself and have amazing new experiences. You'll build confidence, resilience, skills for work and friendship groups A life-changing experience. A fun time with friends. An op-

portunity to discover new interests and talents. A tool to develop essential skills for life and work. A recognised mark of achievement; respected by employers. 14-24 year-olds can do a DofE programme at one of three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

There are four sections to complete at Bronze and Silver level and five at Gold. They involve helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity.

Any young person can do their DofE – regardless of ability, gender, background or location. Achieving an Award isn't a competition or about being first. It's all about setting personal challenges and pushing personal boundaries.

Through a DofE programme young people have fun, make friends, improve their self-esteem and build confidence. They gain essential skills and attributes for work and life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working, communication and drive, enhancing CVs and uni and job applications. Employers recognise the work ready skills that Award holders gain.

2019 -20 Registrations for Bronze, Silver and Gold are still available until half term for this years expeditions .

Year 11 Intervention

As they enter Year 11 our aim is for every pupil to reach their maximum potential. In order to provide Year 11 pupils every possibility of success we deliver a number of interventions and twilight sessions. These sessions have proven in previous years to significantly improve pupil performance in exams

Form Time Intervention

During form times in the morning, targeted pupils will be having 6th from mentoring in specific subjects. These are 1-1 tuition sessions in which pupils will have 20 minutes of direct intervention once a week. We currently have these sessions for; Maths, Science and Sociology with Computing and History following in the coming weeks.

PE Bubble

On your child's timetable every other Tuesday periods 4 and 5 they have double PE. This time can be assigned by faculties to offer subject specific intervention where required. This has been used previously to help students catch up on coursework, prepare for exams and exam techniques. It should be made clear to your child that they only do PE during these times if they are not required by other subjects and have not been requested.

Saturday Maths

Last Saturday we had 36 Year 11 pupils attend a one hour Maths session which was lead by a 6th form mentor. These sessions focus on pupils specifics area of weaknesses from past exams and from teacher feedback in order to maximise the potential of these sessions. If your child has been invited to one of these sessions we would really appreciate your support in helping them to attend, results have shown in previous years that pupils Maths grades significantly improve by attending these sessions.

I recently have been on a 4 week expedition to Borneo for which I had to individually fundraise £4080. During the 4 weeks, whilst living from a rucksack, my team and I managed to plant over 250 trees in areas of the rainforest affected by wildfires which in the long term will support the diverse wildlife that lives within the Borneo rainforest. More work included: plastering the walls of a central community centre for the village, bricklaying the walls of a public toilet and storage for the whole community to use, digging the foundations for an educational centre and digging and installing drainage systems for monsoon season to reduce the amount of stagnant water and therefore mosquito population within that village. More cultural tasks included teaching English to the local children and coaching sport including lots of tug of war which is taken very seriously within Borneo. The 4 weeks was concluded with a 5 day trek through the jungle sleeping in hammocks.
